The Bluebook is currently in its 21st edition, released in June 2020. It is available as a print book and as an electronic publication. To buy a print copy or a subscription to the electronic version, visit www.legalbluebook.com. There is also a free online trial available.

We highly recommend tabbing your Bluebook. See tabbing suggestions below.

Law Reviews & Journals use the Whitepages. Ignore the Bluepages. The quick reference guide inside the front cover of the Bluebook and the list of rules on the back cover are helpful. Do not use the inside back cover references since they refer to the Bluepages. See Bluebook Tip Sheet below for additional information.

We also recommend the Bluebook practice exercises on the <u>LexisNexis Interactive Citation</u> Workstation (ICW).

# **BLUEBOOK TIP SHEET**

## **CHECKLIST**

- 1. What Type of source is this?
- 2. What do I abbreviate / omit?
- 3. What is the Typeface for each part of the citation?
- 4. What is the correct spacing for each part of the citation?
- 5. If multiple citations:
  - (a) Are the citations in the correct order?
  - (b) Should there be periods between the citations or semi-colons (based on signals if NO signals, then use semi-colons)
- 6. Is there a period at the end of my citation?

## **CASES**

- Case names in footnotes and endnotes are not italicized or underlined for full citations
- Case names for short form are italicized/ underlined
- Check abbreviations (pgs. 99-107, 304-328)
- Check omissions (pgs. 99-101)
- Check spacing on reports
- Format for including opinions not by majority (concurring/ dissenting) (pg. 109) ex. [Full citation] (Cardozo, J., concurring).
- Period is always placed at the end of the citation sentence

#### **ARTICLES**

- journals are Big Cap/ Small Cap
- article titles are italicized/underlined
- know when to abbreviate and when not to
  - do not abbreviate article titles
  - abbreviate journals

## **BOOK**

- do not abbreviate book title
- check Typeface for author and title

#### **STATUTES**

- add a space between the "\$" symbol and the section number
- add two "\section," symbols when statute is referencing more than one section, but do not use more than two symbols
- Types: codes, session laws, amendments
  - see general formatting table for different types of statutes on pages 120-21
- know when to abbreviate and when not to (similar to internet/ secondary sources) (see, e.g., pgs. 120-121)

#### **INTERNET**

- check chart on pages 174-75 for correct formatting of source (when to italicize, Big cap/small cap, regular Font)
- abbreviate months when necessary
- know when to abbreviate and when not to

#### **OTHER**

- Constitutions (pg. 119)
  - check abbreviations
  - check number formatting (roman numerals vs. regular numbers)
  - check "§" symbol
- Administrative and Executive Materials (pg. 142)
  - Federal Regulations
  - reports
- Abnormal Case formats (chart on pg. 96)
  - briefs (also on pg. 114)
  - unpublished decisions (slip op.) (pg. 117)
  - petitions for certiorari (also on pg. 116)
  - subsequent and prior history
- Court Filings (for documents that are NOT a part of the same case) (pg. 114-116)
  - briefs
  - complaint
  - transcript
  - petition for certiorari

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#### GENERAL

- Period is always placed at end of the citation sentence
- Order of cites should be ordered in a logical manner (pg. 65)
- Check signals
  - if signals are contradictory, a period goes in between each cite in a list of citations; if the signals have the same connotation, a semi-colon is put in between each cite
  - italicize signals
- Numbers for case reporters or journal editions end in either "th" or "d" depending on the number (e.g., 2nd becomes 2d and 4th stays 4th)
- do not use Id. when there is an intervening source
- no period between citation and explanatory parenthetical
- when to use Supra (do not use for cases, statutes, constitutions, legislative materials . . .)
- check Typeface (pg. 69-76)

## **FORMATTING**

- READ DIRECTIONS
- Make sure to italicize, underline, or use SMALL CAPS when required

# TABBING THE BLUEBOOK

Tabbing is a personal preference. The following are tabbing suggestions, but please do this however it will be most helpful for you personally. In addition to these tabs, it is helpful to tab other pages that you find yourself referencing frequently. Tab these on the top of the book instead of the side to differentiate from the tabs on the side.
