Business Practices in the U.S. is a travel experience for School of Management majors and opportunity to learn how you can make an impact in major cities/states across the country.
Requirements: MGG 211, travel, complete mini-case project with presentation, five-minute documentary on LinkedIn, short reflection paper.



Child Advocacy Studies (CAST) is intended to prepare a wide variety of future professionals to recognize and respond to child abuse and neglect.
Requirements: 9 credits: SW 225, SW 235, SW 245 plus program portfolio, integrative reflective statement and written testimonial from program coordinator.



Crime and Justice in a Diverse Society prepares you to work in the criminal justice system.
Requirements: 9 credits: SOC 211 + 2 select SOC electives plus a 5-page paper.



Data Science in Engineering provides you a unique opportunity to gain valuable skills in the area of data science.
Requirements: 6 credits: EAS 345, EAS 346, Data Science Internship and Capstone Activity.



Gender and Globalization empowers you to think critically about power, inequality and marginalization within a global context.
Requirements: 9 credits: GGS 205 + 2 select GGS electives plus an integrative final project (paper, poster, or presentation) and a policy brief.



Intercultural and Global Competency is an opportunity to assess and apply the competencies gained in a global programs experience, virtually or in person and outside the United States.
Requirements: completion of 3 credit global experience course with a country-specific team project, journal and reflection.



Prominence in Leadership is a self-managed program for School of Management Honors Students that that will help you develop your leadership competency.
Requirements: 9 credits: MGB 359, MGB 360, MGB 361 (1 credit each), presentation, 6 credits flexible of electives.



Understanding Diversity through Sociology allows you to signal to future employers an in-depth specialization in the study of diversity from a sociological lens.
Requirements: 9 credits: SOC 211 + 2 select SOC electives plus a paper response to one of two prompts and a diversity statement for an employer.
